- Listen, learn, adapt



BLACK HEROES IN MEDICINE

- Matilda A. Evans, MD (1872 1935) Columbia, SC: First Black Licensed medical doctor in the state of SC, 1897
- Joseph A. Mason, MD (1884 1966) Kingstree, SC: Chief of Staff for Benevolent Societies Hospital
- Cyril Spann, MD (1916 1979) Columbia, SC: Chief of Staff for the Good Samaritan-Waverly Hospital; first licensed Black surgeon in SC

VICTORY THROUGH COVID-19 VACCINES WITH SC BLACK HEROES IN MEDICINE

"Victory Through **COVID-19 Vaccines with SC Black Heroes in Medicine**" uses illustrations and stories of Matilda A. Evans, MD, Cyril O. Spann Sr., MD, and Joseph A. Mason, MD, three Black physicians from South Carolina history to project examples from our past of overcoming health threats and disparities through persistence, education and science.

PERSISTENCE

South Carolina in the 1800s: Severe Jim Crow Jaws were passed after the Reconstruction period following the Civil War. Public segregation was enforced, and movement of Black laborers was strictly controlled. After 1890, almost all Blacks lost their political vote, until federal legislation of the Voting Rights Act of 1965. The War had ruined the state's economy, and with continued overreliance on agriculture as its main economic base south Carolina was one of the poorer states economically in the country.

In this hostile environment, Aiken native Matilda Evans persisted. She received her M.D. in 1897 and came to Columbia, South Carolina, where she established a successful medical practice. She treated both white and Black patients, and was in great demand. She practiced obstetrics, gynecology, and surgery, and cared for patients in her own home until she established the Taylor Lane Hospital (the first Black hospital in the city of Columbia) in 1901. In addition, Evans ran her own farm and offered a program of recreational activities for underprivileged boys.






Health Disparities during the COVID-19 Pandemic


COVID-19 Cases by Primary Language

COVID-19 Cases by Race/Ethnicity







The Result

Escritura de Terra Indígena 1656



Esta escritura de terra de 1656 transfere a propriedade de uma antiga vila indígena Nipmuc e uma plantação próxima a Saxonville Falis, de cinco homens indígenas – William Boman, Capitão Josiah (Pennahanit), Roger, James e Keaquisam – para o colonizador inglês John Stone. Os homens eram provavelmente ex-moradores da terra em questão. Quando a escritura foi assinada eles moravam no local chamado "plantação da oração", na cidade de Natick, então, uma vila de estilo inglês estabelecida pelo reverendo John Elliot para converter os indígenas dos grupos Algonquian, incluindo, os kipmucs para o Cristianismo.

Este documento nos faz vislumbrar as histórias dos povos indígenas, cujas vozes foram excluídas da transação. É revelador que esta escritura tenha sido escrita em inglês para o beneficio dos ingleses, e convenientemente deixou os cinco homens a representar todos os antigos habitantes, embora eles não soubessem falar inglês ou entender as leis inglesas. Sabemos disso pelo uso de impressões digitais ao invés de assinaturas na escritura.
