We don't use the Book Eye. Nevertheless at UIC, we have a file naming structure we use that includes a collection acronym, and at least a box, folder, and item number. This is so we can at least find the original based on the digital file name. We're in the experimental phase for linking the digital files to the finding aid in two ways: 1) embedding digital files in the finding aid, and 2) creating core metadata based on the finding aid description to enable mass digitization
