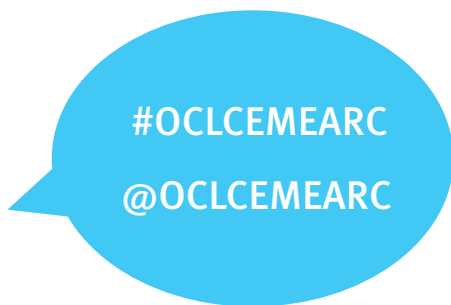

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Welcome



Welcome to the fourth EMEA Regional Council Meeting in the beautiful city of Strasbourg.

The EMEA Regional Council Meeting has evolved into a yearly event for OCLC members in Europe, the Middle East and Africa. I am pleased that every year an increasing number of members take the opportunity to be present and meet and share with other members from more than 26 different countries. The EMEA Regional Council Executive Committee has organised an interesting and inspiring two day programme entitled *Dynamic Data: a world of possibilities*.

It is the first time the EMEA Regional Council Meeting has come to France. Strasbourg is the capital and principal city of the Alsace region (famous for its wine and food) in eastern France and is the official seat of the European Parliament and many other European institutions.

The city offers a wide choice of museums, theatres, restaurants and most importantly, libraries. The Bibliothèque Nationale et Universitaire (BNU) is, with its collection of more than 3,000,000 titles, the second largest library in France after the Bibliothèque nationale de France (BnF). The municipal library Bibliothèque Municipale de Strasbourg (BMS) administers a network of ten medium-sized libraries in different areas of the town. At six stories high “Grande Bibliothèque”, the Médiathèque André Malraux, was inaugurated on 19 September 2008 and is considered the largest in eastern France. The city could not be a more appropriate setting for the fourth EMEA Regional Council Meeting.

The theme of the Meeting this year broadly reflects the massive changes we are seeing in the technological landscape. Large-scale aggregations of data have massive value to technologists, particularly if it is recognised as authoritative. At OCLC we are participating in the W3C Library Linked Data Incubator Group adapting files like VIAF (Virtual International Authority File) into linked datasets. And are actively exploring modelling issues with bibliographic data, looking at models from the British Library, Library of Congress and Europeana. This work and other linked data projects will be explored during the course of the Meeting.

Last year, we launched our WorldShare strategy and announced the phased transition of services to our collaborative platform. This year the first libraries in Europe will go live with WorldShare Management Services, which we will have a chance to hear more about firsthand. We are also delighted that a member of the EMEA Regional Council Executive Committee, Raymond Bérard, will be presenting a view of the landscape as seen by his library network, ABES. Why do they think a move to ‘the cloud’ is desirable? And what are the important considerations that need to be undertaken along the way?

The OCLC EMEA Regional Council Executive Committee has once again been successful in preparing a programme that gives all of us an opportunity to hear about the most recent developments in general sessions and presentations, to debate in smaller sessions, to exchange information and to meet new

members. I would like to thank all of them for their efforts, time and energy they have invested in the organising of this event and the OCLC staff that have supported them.

On behalf of Jay Jordan, President and CEO and all of us at OCLC I wish you an enjoyable and entertaining stay in Strasbourg.

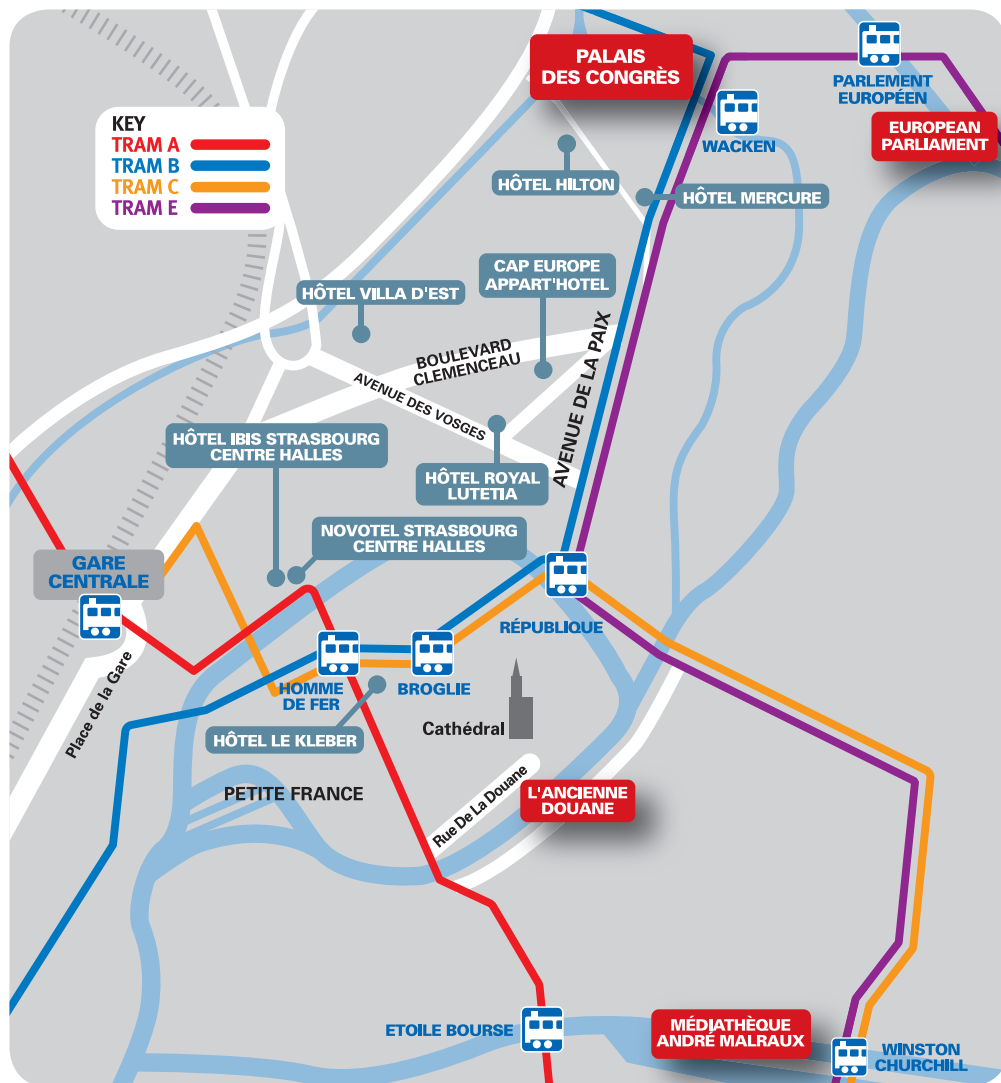

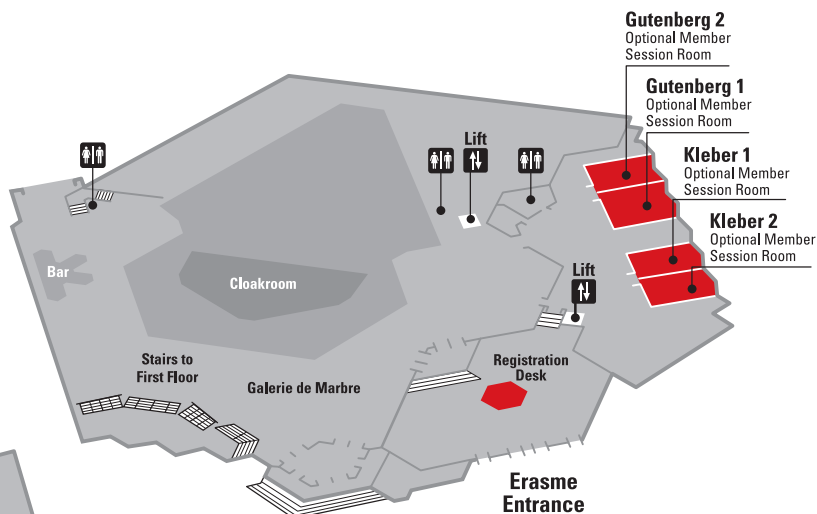

Location of venues & tram routes

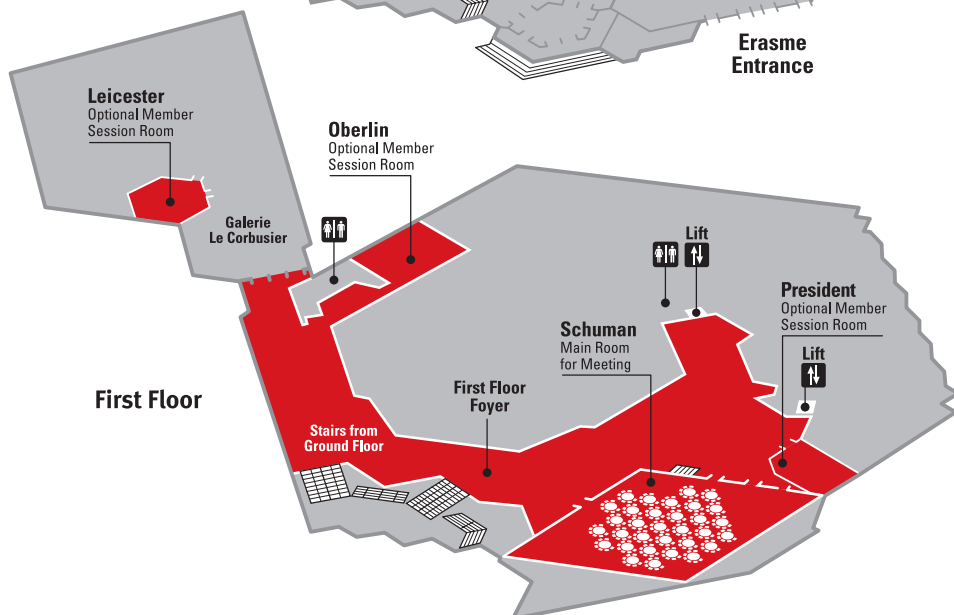


Venue floor plans

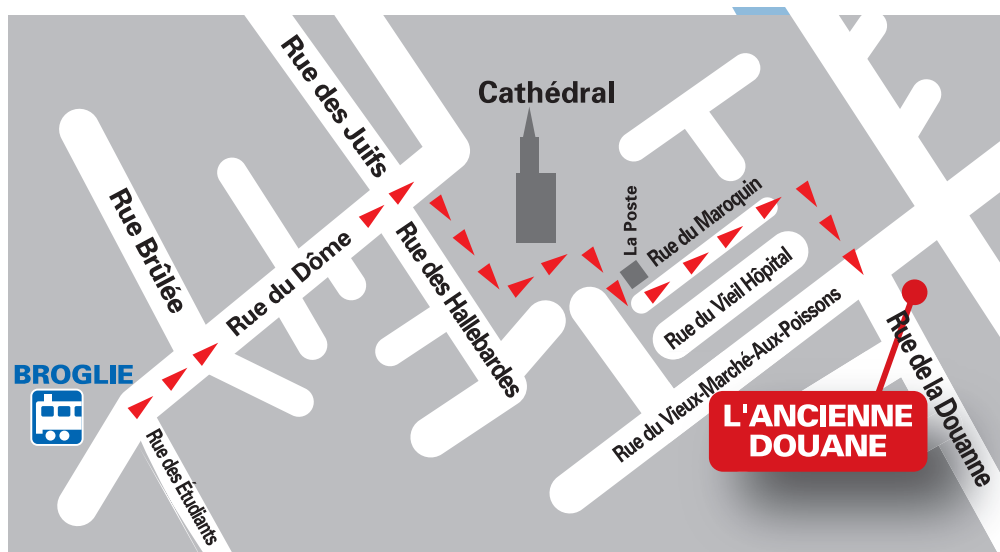
This is an informal session so if the presenter is not at their board take note of their contact details, or leave a message for them on the board near the 1st Floor Information Desk.

The WorldShare Metadata Directions member session provides an opportunity for discussion on the future of metadata management with a broad view of member and OCLC staff perspectives. The format will include a panel of OCLC staff and member delegates. The member panellists will describe their use of OCLC services and their views on the evolution of metadata management requirements in their institutions. OCLC staff will provide an update on WorldShare Metadata and comments on the evolving metadata landscape.

WorldShare Metadata is part of OCLC's strategy to provide webscale solutions to the full range of library workflows. WorldShare Metadata will provide a complete metadata management solution for physical, licensed and digital resources across multiple formats. This set of new applications and services will be made available in phases over the next few years. The presenters will also discuss how Linked Data and an emphasis on collaboratively created authoritative data creates new opportunities for the metadata management workflow.

OCLC WorldShare provides a suite of library management applications built on top of the OCLC WorldShare Platform, a global, interconnected Web architecture that supports OCLC's Webscale services and applications, and provides flexible, open access to library data through APIs and other web services.

Fit our Library and Services to Tomorrow's Citizens' Needs - Insight into an Ongoing Process

Chrystie Hill, Director Community Relations OCLC:

Building Community Awareness: Sharing "Geek the Library" campaign and learning's

The library environment presents challenges for library management and marketing. For example, how can libraries offer relevant services to current and potential new library users? Can libraries raise awareness of their financial needs and strengthen their partnerships within their communities? Does the internet pose a mortal threat to the traditional library, or can librarians revitalise their physical spaces by drawing on the power of the online sphere?

In this workshop we will explore how librarians might find answers to these questions. We will hear about the approach of the Frankfurt Public Library to develop library services for the needs of today's and tomorrow's citizens. We will also look at the successful US community awareness and marketing campaign "geek-the-library" and plans for a localization of the campaign for German speaking countries in Europe.

Dr. Klaus Ceynowa is the Deputy-Director General of the Bavarian State Library at Munich, Germany. His main fields of work are strategic and financial planning, human resources management, and controlling and marketing for libraries in the digital age.

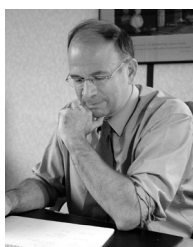
He was responsible for negotiating the contract between the Bavarian State Library and Google for the digitization of the complete copyright-free collections of the Library from the 17th to the 19th century, which is more than 1 Million books.



Jean-Baptiste Michel

Fellow, Harvard University

Jean-Baptiste Michel is a French and Mauritian scientist at Harvard University. His research tackles quantitative problems at the interface of biology, mathematics and the social sciences. Together, Jean-Baptiste and Erez Lieberman Aiden develop quantitative approaches to the study of history and culture that relies on computational analysis of a significant fraction of the historical record, an approach they call culturomics. Their work led to the creation of the Google Ngram Viewer, a website for browsing cultural trends that was visited over a million times in the 24 hours after its launch.

Raymond Bérard is currently Director of the Bibliographic Agency for Higher Education (ABES), which is in charge of the union catalogue for French academic libraries. ABES also licenses e-resources for French universities and research organizations and develops innovative services to meet the information needs of the French academic community.

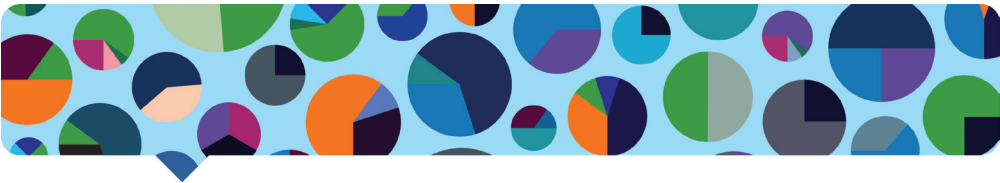
