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




What is the EPC?

Last year, Michel Lefebvre of the Bibliothèque et Archives Nationales de Québec relayed to the editorial team a request for indexing of the spices caraway and cumin. We replied that we would investigate enhancing the indexing at the classes for spices and hot spices. We were not certain whether the effort would only involve indexing or would lead to changes that would warrant an exhibit. This exhibit recommends continuation of several individual spices with sufficient literary warrant from 633.83 and 633.84 cm.

A note about the food schedules: classes under 641.33-641.35 Specific food from plant crops build from 633-635 Specific plant crops, in the agriculture schedules. Typically, the numbers in 641.33-641.35 are the interdisciplinary numbers for their topics, e.g., 641.3574 Chocolate, despite the fact that they are built numbers and those in 633-635 are not. Thus, the proposed continuations are in the agriculture schedules. While somewhat unusual, this is not incorrect, and has long been the practice in the 600s. Even if we wanted to change this, a different exhibit would be required.

In order to identify individual spices with literary warrant for continuations, we thus checked uses in the numbers for spices and hot spices in both the food and agriculture schedules, as well as those in the hierarchies of 641.6 Cooking specific foods and 664 Food technology.

Proposed continuations

There are five topics each named in the including notes at 633.83 Spices and 633.84 Hot spices. We investigated these and looked at usage in WorldCat to see if there were other spices that should be added to these including notes or given classes of their own. The following spices have sufficient literary warrant for their own class (searches performed July 17 via ESS):

Cinnamon	39 results
Ginger	104 results
Black pepper	75 results
Chili peppers*	406 results
Mustard	90 results

"N.b., Currently, "chili" is the topic in the including note at 633.84. However, all other instances of the term "chili" in Dewey refer to the American dish also known as chili con carne. This exhibit proposes using "chili peppers" instead, to match an extant Relative Index term.

Since 633.83 and 633.84 have not been previously subdivided, there is no clear way to choose which numbers to authorize for the individual spices we propose continuing. While plants and animals in the 630s are not primarily organized by taxonomy, it might make sense to put spices from more closely related plants together. But there are no close relationships between the plants that produce black pepper, chili peppers, or mustard; there, we simply propose developing chili peppers and black peppers nearby since they fill similar culinary roles.

Grouping related spices together allows us to leave space for future developments—and to move some spices out of standing room at 633.83 even if there isn't sufficient literary warrant for continuing to their own number. Ginger clearly does have such levels of literary warrant, while cardamom (10 titles) and turmeric (15 titles) do not. But since cardamom, ginger, and turmeric are closely related, all coming from plants in the same family (Zingiberaceae), we propose continuing all three topics to a new number, 633.832. A standard-subdivisions-are-added note will indicate that standard subdivisions can be added for ginger alone, as well as for the three spices treated together.

Similarly, we recommend continuing cinnamon (mentioned in the including note) and cassia (presumably in standing room) from 633.83 to a new number 633.834. Both of these spices come from the barks of plants from the genus Cinnamonum. Though not true synonyms, the same product may be called "cassia" or "cinnamon" depending on context.

Proposed additions to including notes

Additionally, we identified two spices currently in standing room at 633.83 with sufficient literary warrant to be added to the including note there: saffron (8 titles) and stevia (7 titles). There were no such spices from standing room at 633.84.

Other indexing matters

Currently, there is a Relative Index term "Saffron (Spice)" indexed to 584.75 Iridaceae, in the botany schedules. This is misleading, since works on spices themselves belong in the 600s. With the addition of saffron to the including note at 633.83, we recommend moving the index term there, and establishing a term "Saffron (Spice)—botany" for 584.75.

Sadly, there is not sufficient literary warrant for continuing caraway or cumin, nor for adding them to an including note. They tend not to be covered individually in the literature. Nevertheless, there is an existing RI term for Caraway. Given the minimal literary warrant, it would be more appropriate to mark it as electronic-only; removing it altogether would run counter to users' interests.






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
